What is the Migrant Program?

The migrant education program came into being in 1966 as part of then President Lyndon B. Johnson's "War On Poverty." Education professionals recognized in the creation of the migrant program that children of highly mobile agricultural workers were routinely overlooked and neglected in the overall educational process.

Because their parents moved across school district, county, and/or state boundaries on a frequent basis, migrant children, if enrolled in school, lacked consistent educational programming. Those who enrolled in school, most often, were behind their peers in educational attainment, often faced heightened medical and social problems which further hampered their educational progress, and received less than an adequate education because schools were ill-equipped to meet the instructional needs of children who had limited or non-English speaking abilities and who were highly mobile.



The mission of the migrant education program is to provide educational and human resource service opportunities, which strengthen and enhance the development of the migrant child.

Educational Services We Provide

Our goal is to break down barriers that keep students from learning. We can help with the following:

- School Supplies
- Provide summer school services & middle school summer camp
- Serve as a communication link between staff and home
- Provide books for all ages and all reading levels
- Provide instructional school supplies for parents to work with students at home
- Monitor students' grades, attendance, and discipline
- Prepare preschool children for kindergarten
- Support high school drop outs and parents with services to obtain GED
- Assist students with preparation for post-secondary education
- Assist with smooth transition from one school district to another
- Help pay for field trips
- Help parents during parent/teacher conferences
- Mentor students at school on a regular basis

Health & Parenting Services We Provide

- Assist with dental, hygiene, and medical needs of students
- Assist with meeting physical and immunization requirements for schools
- Assist student/families with basic needs of nutrition, clothing, and shelter
- Assist with referral and linking with other school and community agencies
- Assist families with parent skills
- Provide parenting workshops
